BUSTING PTSD MYTHS

Fact: While not everyone who experiences trauma will develop Posttraumatic Stress Disorder, it is a common invisible wound.



1 in 5
active duty service members show signs of a psychological health concern



7 to 8%
of people will experience PTSD at some point in their lives



10 to 14%
of service members who served in Iraq and/or Afghanistan have developed PTSD

5 MYTHS & FACTS ABOUT PTSD

Seeking help is a sign of strength, but the myths about PTSD can discourage service members from taking the first step.

MYTH: PTSD is always combat-related

FACT:

PTSD can be caused by many types of traumatic experiences like house fires, car accidents and sexual assaults.

MYTH: Service members with PTSD all have the same symptoms

FACT:

Everybody experiences PTSD differently. Symptoms vary in intensity and can include nightmares, flashbacks and trouble concentrating.

MYTH: Only service members experience PTSD

FACT:

Anyone who faces a traumatic event can develop PTSD. It can affect people of any age, gender, race or income level.

MYTH: Service members can never recover from PTSD

FACT:

PTSD is treatable and getting help early can significantly improve your symptoms. PTSD can recur, but treatment can make you feel in control and give you tools to cope.



MYTH: Getting help for PTSD will hurt my ability to get or maintain a security clearance

FACT:

Most service members who seek help from a psychological health professional are able to get or maintain a clearance.

SEEK CARE

PTSD symptoms may not appear until months or years later¹. If you have gone through trauma and are experiencing anger, trouble sleeping, nightmares, intrusive memories, sadness or other concerns, seek care as these may be signs of PTSD. Contact a health care provider to assess your symptoms and discuss treatment options.

TRANSITIONAL JOBS PROGRAM

What is TJ?

Transitional Jobs (TJ) is an employment program that offers unemployed residents immediate work. TJ is a program of Wisconsin's Department of Children and Families. The purpose of TJ is to enhance employment opportunities for people who have difficulty entering and succeeding in the workforce. The TJ employment strategy helps individuals overcome employment barriers and transition into work by using wage-paid, short-term employment that combines real work, skills training, education and supportive services. TJ also offers job coaching, employability planning, life skills development, and limited vocational training, as well as job search assistance.

TJ promotes self-sufficiency by providing time-limited, publicly funded, wage-based jobs in public, nonprofit, or for-profit settings. The goal is to help eligible residents gain a foothold in the labor market with jobs that are available in the public and private sectors. TJ's combination of training, work experience, case management, and supportive services will produce positive results for all the surrounding area job seekers and the employers who "hire" program participants.

Who Qualifies?

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ <u>Adults age 18 to 24 with children</u>: MUST have a child support order, be under a reunification plan, or have been involved in the criminal justice system; or be a youth in foster care and expected to age out of care, or have aged out of foster care. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Must provide at least 20 hours of work per week, but no more than 40 hours per week.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ <u>Adults age 25 years and older</u>: MUST be the biological or adoptive parent of child under age 18; or the relative & primary caregiver of child under age 18 years. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Must report hours worked to UMOS on a predetermined schedule.

ELIGIBILITY



Meet all eligibility criteria for Wisconsin Works (W-2) and have a job or job offer. They do not need to be enrolled but must be a Custodial Parent or a participating Non-Custodial Parent. JAL is provided through W-2.



1. Household income must be equal to or less than 150% of the Federal Poverty Level. WETAP is provided through a Mobility Manager.
2. Employed

REPAYMENT



1. The applicant completes a budget indicating his/her ability to repay the loan in cash within the agreed upon repayment timeframe. They agree to make regular monthly payments.
2. At least 25% of loan must be repaid in cash. The repayment plan may include in-kind community service.
3. Initial repayment period is 12 months, but it may be extended with repayment renegotiation.



1. The applicant completes a budget worksheet to ensure they can pay back the required amount.
2. 75% of loan must be paid back in a 12 month term.

HOW IT WORKS AND WHAT TO EXPECT

Are you staying outside, in a shelter, in your car or fleeing domestic violence?



Contact ONE of the participating agencies listed, in person or on the phone, to complete an assessment.



After the assessment is completed, you will be placed on a Prioritization List. This is NOT a waiting list!



When an agency has an opening in a program, they will contact the person most in need. If you are contacted, you will be asked about your housing status and then you may be asked to meet with someone at that agency.



It is very important to let the agency know if your information changes. **If we can't contact you, we can't help you!**

COORDINATED ENTRY

Coordinated Entry is a way people experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness may find housing and get connected to resources in their community.
